Sport Premium Overview

Nanstallon CP School vision Statement:

At Nanstallon CP School we believe PE & Sport plays an important role in making our vision statement a reality for every pupil, with the potential to change young people's lives for the better.

We have welcomed the Government's announcement in June 2013 to provide additional funding for 2 years to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. We are committed to using this resource in developing high quality PE lessons, alongside greater opportunities for sporting competitions and clubs for all our young people.

Sport Premium Grant

Funding for schools will be calculated by the number of primary aged pupils (between the ages of 5 and 11) as at the annual census in January 2015. All schools with 17 or more primary aged pupils will receive a lump sum of £8,000 plus a premium of £5 per pupil. Smaller schools will receive an additional £500.

What does the Sport Premium mean for my School?

'Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this' (DfE June 2013).

At Nanstallon CP School we have split up the funding by the three key areas for consideration; Physical Education, Healthy Active Lifestyles and Competitive Sport. We have also been told that this money must be 'sustainable used', not just spent on

coaches and one off activities. We have decided to spend the Sport Premium Grant on the

following:

Our work developing 'Forest Schools' with Claire Whalley of Badger Schools has been greatly enjoyed by our pupils and really has extended our classrooms into the outdoors. This work will continue in 2015-2016 with each class having an afternoon a week over a half term to benefit from these activities. Spend from Sports premium: £800(in financial year 2015-2016).

Success criteria: Pupils using our grounds to be physically active and develop team work and social skills. Our grounds being used as an 'Outdoor Classroom'.

Outcomes: Pupils enjoyed the activities but staff felt that they could in future be better linked to class topics.

As part of our building programme we will transform the current class 4 into a small hall/dining/assembly area. This will mean that we will be able to hold simple indoor PE activities with our smaller pupils around movement and dance. This will make a huge difference to what we can offer these children and means we will be able to sustain PE for ks1 whatever the weather. Spend from Sports Premium: £4500

Success criteria: pupils in classes 1 and 2 will be able to undertake high quality movement lessons in a suitable space regardless of the weather.

Outcomes: The new space created in the old hall by the provision of the new class will enable us to use the school for indoor PE for Key Stage 1 pupils. In addition we will investigate using the space with older pupils for dance classes.. This will be a major bonus for the school and should enable us to provide a wider PE curriculum.

Using The Callywith Centre for gymnastics last year was a real strength of our provision and meant that pupils benefited from high quality teaching in a purpose built environment. Although this was costly we will ensure that all ks1 pupils enjoy this again and if possible give each ks2 class half a term of gymnastics too. Spend: £2400 Success criteria: school is able to provide a broad PE curriculum including gymnastics that engages and enriches pupils.

Outcomes: Pupils in Key Stage 1 enjoyed a term of gymnastics and greatly enjoyed the experience. They became more confident in moving and mastered a wide range of basic moves. We will certainly continue with this if we are able to.

The school will once again use external providers to run an after school football club for Year 2 up. Last year these clubs were very popular being attended by up to 20 pupils from classes 2 and 3. This is back by popular demand! Cost £600

Success criteria: Pupils enjoy a wide range of after-school activities and learn to play culturally significant sports such as football and cricket.

Outcomes: we used Kernow Sports successfully to run a football club before Christmas 2015 but when we attempted to start again in 2016 there were not sufficient interested pupils to make it viable.

The Lanydrock Schools Partnership held two sports related activities for pupils last year. These were viable because we used sports money to provide transport and tuition. We aim to continue this work in the coming year to provide more sporting activities for pupils across the trust. Cost £1000

Outcomes: The work undertaken by the LSP was very worthwhile:

Participation in the Dance at The Hall for Cornwall provided a platform for our gifted and talented dancers to work together and perform to a huge audience.

Working together in the cluster to develop a joint swimming team provided a chance for our most able swimmers to experience a high level of competitive sport.

We were for the second time able to host a sports event for all ks1/Year1 pupils from the cluster schools, A really positive morning, well supported by PE leaders from Bodmin College.

Please note the additional sums required to finance this programme will be found from money rolled over from 2014-2015.
