Sport Premium Overview

Nanstallon CP School vision Statement:

At Nanstallon CP School we believe PE & Sport plays an important role in making our vision statement a reality for every pupil, with the potential to change young people's lives for the better.

We have welcomed the Government's announcement in June 2013 to provide additional funding for 2 years to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. We are committed to using this resource in developing high quality PE lessons, alongside greater opportunities for sporting competitions and clubs for all our young people.

Sport Premium Grant

Funding for schools will be calculated by the number of primary aged pupils (between the ages of 5 and 11) as at the annual census in January 2013. All schools with 17 or more primary aged pupils will receive a lump sum of £8,000 plus a premium of £5 per pupil. Smaller schools will receive an additional £500.

Total no of primary aged pupils between the ages of 5-11(Jan 2013) 74

Total amount of Sport Premium Grant received £8670

What does the Sport Premium mean for my School?

'Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this' (DfE June 2013).

At Nanstallon CP School we have split up the funding by the three key areas for consideration; Physical Education, Healthy Active Lifestyles and Competitive Sport.

We have also been told that this money must be 'sustainable used', not just spent on coaches and one off activities. We have decided to spend the Sport Premium Grant on the following:

After consultation with the school council and members of staff, we have highlighted the playground as a key area for development and are allocating approximately £3000 to this. By focusing on this area we aim to improve children's physical wellbeing, give children an opportunity to develop their skills, further improve their behavior and develop social skills.

All the children have been involved in choosing the new playground markings. This will take quite a significant part of our budget but will be a resource that lasts and lasts. We will also use a small part of our budget to refresh our general playground equipment.

Success Criteria: Pupils physically active at playtimes and lunchtimes and display good behavior and social skills. Outcomes for 2014-2015-New playground markings were completed February 2015. We have employed Miss Nash to encourage children to use them and model games. This has worked well, good numbers of younger children especially observed using markings at lunch time and engaged in playing games. No need to replicate this in current year. Actual spend: £2070

We will purchase Sport related APPs for our iPads. Approximately £400

Success Criteria: Pupil's performance in PE and sport will be enhanced through the use of technology which will enable them to measure, reflect on and improve the quality of their work. Outcomes for 2014-2015. Ipads used by pupils in Class 2 to help improve their dance. Ipads being used by classes 2 and 3 this half term to analyse performance in athletics. Outcomes are not yet as good as they could be, children enjoy watching their own performances but have not yet used the technology to help improve performances. Needs further work to implement properly. Actual spend:£0

Approximately £500 will be used to employ an additional adult at lunchtimes to help train pupils to become 'Playground leaders' encourage game play and develop intra school sport.

Success Criteria: Pupils taking 'lead' roles within the playground, pupils physically active at playtimes and lunchtimes and taking part in intra-school sport. Outcomes for 2014-2015. As noted above Miss Nash has been employed to work with children at lunch but her role has changed to more of her working directly with groups. That has worked well. May change this next year. Actual spend: £150

We are keen to use our school site to its full potential and are currently trialing 'Forest School' activities. At present, we are hoping to invest approximately £500 of our funding to develop and resource this area of the curriculum.

Success Criteria: Pupils using our grounds to be physically active and develop team work and social skills. Our grounds being used as an 'Outdoor Classroom'. Outcomes for 2014-2015. This has proved very popular with children, parents and staff. Skillful practitioners have been able to extend the classroom out of doors, have promoted social skills and really have promoted healthy lifestyles. All children in the school have enjoyed half a term of

forest school. We will continue this next year. Each class to work on forest schools for half a term. Actual spend: £2423

Our School is blessed with fantastic grounds but we are aware that we are limited by our site in the delivery of Dance and Gymnastics. Over this school year we have been investigating how we can deliver Dance and Gymnastics better. We are planning to make links with outside clubs and specially trained teachers to help us deliver these areas better and to improve our ability to teach these subjects. We will be investing approximately £1000 pounds in researching and developing this area.

Success Criteria: Links developed with 'Out of School' Dance and Gymnastic Clubs. The effective delivery of Dance and Gymnastics. Outcomes for 2014-2015. Children in Class 2 and Class 3 benefitted for half a term of dance each at a dance studio in Bodmin. Some lively and challenging tasks were devised and were enjoyed by many children however a significant minority were not as engaged as they could have been and we will make alternative provision next year. Cost in 2014-2015: £1200

We trialed gymnastics at The Callywith Centre with Class 1 in the autumn term and this proved to be very successful. The centre has excellent resources, staff are skillful and understand the capacity of children of this age. We rolled this out to the rest of the school in the summer term 2015. Again this proved very successful with children and will help develop a love of physical education and activity. Costs are high but we judge to be good value for money as this gives the children experiences that they cannot otherwise experience and helps the school to provide a rounded pe curriculum. Actual spend: £2880

In addition we used Sports Premium to provide after school provision in football and cricket through the spring and summer terms 2015. Attendance at the cricket club is particularly good and the coaches were able to accommodate pupils from all classes. Up to 20 children attend Cricket Club. Actual spend: £718

As part of the ongoing development of the new school curriculum we are continuing to audit what we want, and what we need to do before we decide how to spend the remainder of the money! Audit of skills, summer 2014; £400, to be followed by revised spending plan in next year's school improvement plan, September 2014.

Success Criteria:

Audit will enable school to target remaining moneys effectively to ensure future spend meets pupil needs. Outcomes for 2014-2015. We were unable to secure someone to carry

out an audit this year, our partner secondary school declined, which is disappointing! We will look to alternative sources to get this done next year.

Other work funded by sports premium in 2014-2015

We used sports premium money to fund two activities for gifted and talented children in The Lanhydrock Schools' Partnership:

Children from all 3 schools worked together with Cornwall Dance republic to devise and perform a dance at The Hall for Cornwall in February 2015. This was very well received and benefitted 6 ks2 children.

Children from all three schools will be forming a swimming team to take part in the area swimming gala. This has meant competition for places and has put a premium on performance! It will also mean that our most talented swimmers will be able to compete on a much more equal footing.

Cost of both of these activities: £200

In addition money was spent on new equipment for use at lunchtimes, see above and new goals for the field. Actual spend: £2660

£160 was spent on membership of Poltair Sports Partnership which ensures we stay up to date with latest developments in PE.

A further £610 was spent on high-viz jackets and all in one suits which will ensure that children stay dry and safe when undertaking outdoor activities.

Total spend for 2014-5: £12961
